DPRK Launches Multiple Missiles

North Korea launched at least seven ballistic missiles on Wednesday and Thursday. One of the missiles launched on Thursday morning flew a lofted trajectory at a max. altitude of 2,000 km and distance of 750 km.

The missiles were launched either in response to U.S.-ROK exercises or to improve missile capabilities. Japan issued a wrong "J-Alert" warning a missile was flying over Miyagi, Yamagata, and Niigata. It was later reported the alert may have captured parts of the missile that had fallen off.

G7 Foreign Ministers Meeting

On Nov. 3-4, the G7 foreign ministers met in Münster, Germany. The members underlined their sense of unity and their unshakeable commitment to uphold the **rules**-

based international order and to **protect the rights of all,** including the most vulnerable.

The ministers' statement called on **Russia** to stop its war; condemned Russia for its actions; committed to more cooperation on **economic security issues**; named concerns regarding **Iran** and **China**; strongly condemned the **DPRK** missile launches; and pledged broad cooperation to bring lasting stability in **Africa**.

<u>Opposition Threatens No-</u> <u>Confidence Vote Over UC Issue</u>

On Friday, CDP leader Izumi
Kenta warned the ruling coalition

consider a no-confidence vote if
it refused to form a consensus on
a bill to help relieve victims of the

ruling coalition is focusing on
revising existing legislation.
