Japan and China Ramp Up Engagements

Japan and the People's Republic of China held meetings at various levels this week, in a sign that both sides desire continued dialogue amid U.S.-PRC competition and soured Japan-PRC ties due to issues like the detainment of Japanese nationals and the seafood import ban.

On Friday, Minister for Foreign
Affairs Kamikawa Yoko held a
meeting with PRC Foreign Minister
Wang Yi on the sidelines of the East
Asia Summit Foreign Ministers'
Meeting in Vientiane, Laos.
Kamikawa urged the PRC to revoke
its seafood import ban related to
the release of treated water from
Fukushima Daiichi and the
resumption of visa waivers.

LDP General Affairs Chair Moriyama Hiroshi met Wang during his visit to Beijing on Tuesday, where he urged the PRC to resume beef imports frozen since 2001. The two sides emphasized the importance of mutually beneficial strategic relations. Moriyama also met with Liu
Jianchao, head of the CCP's
International Department, where
Liu voiced his desire to resume ruling
party dialogues by the end of the
year. Japan's other engagements
this month include Health Minister
Takemi Keizo's visit from July 17-19,
marking the first visit by a health
minister in six years.

Vice Speaker of the House of Representatives Kaieda Banri also visited China and met Zhao Leji, Chairman of the National's People Congress (NPC) Standing Committee, on Monday and discussed the importance of working toward restarting lawmaker exchanges between the Diet and the NPC.

On Monday, Vice Minister for Foreign Affairs Okano Masataka held the first bilateral Strategic Dialogue in four years with Ma Zhaoxu, his counterpart. The two concurred on the importance of mutually beneficial strategic relations and promoting a constructive and stable bilateral relationship.
